## WHAT IS A "CORE COURSE"?

- Determination made by NCAA Eligibility Center
- Criteria:
- Course must be a recognized academic course and qualify for high school graduation credit in one of the following a reas: English, math, natural/ physic al science, social science, foreign language or nondoctrinal religion/philosophy.
- Course must be considered college prep by the high school;
- Math course must be at the level of Algebra I or higher,
- Course must be taught by a qualified instructor as defined by the appropriate academic authority (e.g., high school, school district); and,
- Course must be taught at the high school's regularacademic level.
- *NEW- ESLClasses-Petition to be accepted as English Core


## WHAT IS NOT A "CORE COURSE"?

- Courses in non-core areas or vocational courses
- Courses that prepare student for the world of work or life, orfora 2-yearcollege ortechnical school
- Coursesthat are taught below grade level or at a slower pace, with less depth or rigor
- Coursesthat are not academic in nature
- Fine Art courses ca nnot be a pproved in a ny core a rea
- Computer Science courses at high schools that a ward technology credit


## LEARNING DISABILITIES

- Must be appropriately diagnosed (same standards as all other students)
- Accommodations
- May take a nonstandard ACTorSATtest (e.g., extra time)
- May use courses for students with education-impacting disa bilities for the purpose of meeting core-course requirements.
- Courses STLL must be on high school's 48-H
- "Plus Three" exception
- Division I: Student must graduate 'on time' in order to use up to three additional approved core courses taken before full-time enrollment in college
- Division II: May use a ny a pproved core courses taken before fulltime collegiate enrollment
- Not subject to limitation of 3 core courses


## CALCULATING CORE COURSE GPA

- Eligibility Center calc ulates the grade-point average on a 4.000 scale.
- $A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1$; $A$ 'pass' is classified as a $D$ in pass/fail class
- No plusor minus grades when calculating core course GPA
- If your high school uses a numeric scale, you need to provide NCAA with a conversion to a letter grade.
- Weighted scalescan be approved forAP and Honorclasses

## DI ACADEMIC QUALIFICATIONS

For college-bound stud ent-a thletes enrolling full time at an NCAA Division I college or university on or after August 1, 2016, there are three possible academic outcomes:

1. Qualifier $=$ competition, a thletic s a id (sc hola rship), and practice the first year.
2. Academic redshirt $=$ a thletics a id the first year, practice in first regularacademic tem (semester or quarter).
3. Nonqualifier $=$ no athletics aid, practice or competition the first year.

## DI - CORE COURSE GPA AND TEST SCORE REQUIREMENT

- To be deemed Qualifier:
- Has minimum Core GPA of $\mathbf{2 . 3 0 0}$
- Core Course GPA, NOTOverall GPA on Transcripts
- GPA meets corresponding SATorACTtest score on sliding scale
- Use cumulative ACTScore
- NOTcomposite score
- Sum of English, math, reading, and science
- Do not include writing score

## DI - CORE COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- Qualifier Requirements:
- Core Course Requirement (16)
- Core Course GPA (2.3)
- Test Score (sliding scale)
- Combination of best test scores will be used to certify students
- Proof of Graduation
- Time limitation
- Must complete 10 core courses before $7^{\text {th }}$ semester of high school (e.g., senioryear)
- Of the 10 core courses completed, 7 must be in English, Math or Science
- Those 10 core courses become 'locked in' forthe purpose of GPA calculation
- A repeat of one of the 'locked in' courses will not be used if taken after the $7^{\text {th }}$ semester begins.

- Time Limitation
- You must complete core curric ulum not later than the high school graduation date of the prospect's class
- "Plus 1" Exception
- One core course after high school graduation


## DI - EARLY ACADEMIC CERTIFICATION

- Students who meet the following criteria aftersix semesters will be certified as qualifiers:
- DI: Minimum score of 900 SAT/75 ACTand core course GPA of 3.000 or higher in a minimum of 14 core courses:
- English - 3 years;
- Math - 2 years;
- Natural or Physical Science - 2 years;
- 2 additional core courses in English, Math, or N/P Sc ience; and
- 5 additional core courses in a ny NCAA core a rea.

Still need to send FINAL transc ripts to Eligibility Center before February $1^{\text {st }}$ of the freshman year

## DI - ACADEMIC REDSHIRT: REQUIREMENTS FOR SCHOLARSHIP AND PRACTICE

- 16 core courses in the following areas:

4 years English,
3 years math at Algebra I level or higher,
2 years natural or physical science (one lab if offered by any school attended);
1 year additional English, math or natural/physical science;
2 years social science; and
4 years additional from areas above or foreign language, philosophy or comparative religion.

- Minimum required GPA.

Minimum GPA of 2.000-2.299 in 16 core courses.


- Sliding scale.

Minimum ACT sum or SAT score (critical reading/math only) that matches the 16 core-course GPA.

## WHAT IF A STUDENT DOES NOT MEET EITHER SET OF REQUIREMENTS?

If a college-bound student-athlete does not meet either set of requirements, he/she is a nonqualifier.

A nonqualifier:

- Cannot receive athletics aid during the first year at an NCAA Division I college or university.
- Cannot practice or compete during the first year at a Division I college or university.
- Note: Some institutions do NOT allow nonqualifiers

## NCAA DII NEW ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

## Division II

- In orderto be eligible forcompetition on or after August 1, 2018, students must...
- Complete the required 16 core courses. There still is not a time limitation to complete the core courses
- Eam a minimum 2.200 GPA or better in your core courses.
- Eam a Minimum SATorACTscore that matchesthe 16 core-course GPA on the full qualifier sliding scale.
- SAT- Only count critical reading and math sections
- ACT- Score is sum of English, math, reading, and science

## DII - EARLY ACADEMIC CERTIFICATION

Minimum sc ore of 1000 SATor 85 sum ACT, a nd core course GPA of 3.000 or higher in a minimum of 12 core courses:

- English - 3 years;
- Math - 2 years;
- Natural or Physical Science - 2 years; a nd
- 5 additional core courses in a ny NCAA core area.

Still need to send FINAL transcripts to Eligibility Center before February $1^{\text {st }}$ of the following year

## DIII - ACADEMIC CERTIFICATION

- Not certified by NCAA Eligibility Center
- Eligibility for admission, financial aid, practice and competition is determined by the college or university.
- DIII Model
- No athletic aid
- Shorter playing and practice seasons
- Lower number of contests
- Focus on regional and conference play


## RECOMMENDATIONS

- Start planning now!
- Gradesasa freshman/sophomore/junioryearMATIER
- Around the beginning of junior year, begin the online registration with the Eligibility Center
- Register to take the ACT, SATor both
- Use the NCAA Eligibility Center code '9999' as a score recipient
- Test sc ores on high school transc ripts will not be used
- Send official tra nsc ripts to the Eligibility Center after completion of junior year
- Prefer electronic submission
- Update and manage the school's 48(H)
- If students fall behind, use summer school session before $7^{\text {th }}$ semester to "c atch up"
- REM INDER to send final offic ial transc ript to the Eligibility Center with proof of graduation
- Letter from high school to university may be requested for ea $1 \mathrm{ly} / \mathrm{summer}$ enrollment


## FINANCIAL AID (SCHOLARSHIPS)

- Financial Aid comes in many forms
- Govemmental assistance(PELL Grant)
- Institutional "need" aid vs. Institutional "ment" a id
- Outside scholarships, Loans, Work Study, etc.
- Extrac uric ular sc hola rships (e.g., Athletics)
- Division I
- May combine athletic said with all other sc holarships EXC EPT institutional "need" aid
- Division II
- Financial aid is "packaged" to find best combination for student
- Division III
- NO a thletic sfinancial aid


## NATIONAL LETTER OF INTENT BASICS

- Not required to sign an NU
- In general, NL is signed only for first year of college
- Agreement to attend the institution for one academic year in exchange for receiving athletic aid for one academic year
- Must have an athletics aid component to agreement (1\%-100\%)
- NEW - Multi-year fina ncial a id a greements now a va ila ble
- Does not guarantee playing time or being a member of a team
- Release from NL may be requested
- Extenua ting circ umsta nces
- If not released, basic penalty is a yearin residence at second institution - Eligible for athletic aid and practice at second institution

### 2.3 OR TAKE A KNEE

To play Division I sports, you need to qualify academically. To meet the minimum requirements for Division I studentathletes enrolling in college in August 2016 or later you must:

- Graduate from high school
- Complete 16 Core Courses, including 10 before your seventh semester
- Earn a minimum 2.300 Grade-Point Average in core courses to compete in your first year of college
- Earn a combined SAT or ACT score that matches your core-course GPA on a sliding scale. For example an 860 SAT score needs a 2.400 GPA for practice and aid and a 2.85 GPA for competition.
